He really could be full of himself sometimes, the only child of a divorced mom. He acts like he is the center of the universe. He could play different characters well. But I believed that I was precious to him. His beloved. Like Jesus and I, he was my lover, husband, and papa to my kids and was becoming my caretaker; tending and keeping our household for a future.

In my support group of women who have been abused I feel stronger. I have every Biblical right to divorce him yet many Christians I love and trust tell me to wait. He is an angry and sorry man. I cannot talk to him without feeling crushed. I can survive by staying the course of divorce. He has not lived in our home for over 7 months and my children are doing okay. The baby has her older brother and sister to distract her. The older ones (7 & 5) are doing better in some ways, worse in others. When there was yelling and tension, they would wet the bed, now that he is gone, they have nightmares. I would worry about what they were learning from this household.

I feel better as I think about divorcing him because I feel more in control and there is no tension in the house. I wish that I could change him but I know that I am the only one I can change. I don't want to talk to him or discuss our relationship until after the divorce. Talking is too hard. If he doesn't try to reconcile or pursue me when we are divorced then I know

the marriage wasn't worth saving. Do you agree?

I know the pain you are experiencing right now is more than you have ever endured. The loss of trust in a trusted mate. Your children will always worry about the fragility of relationship. If you can dump daddy, when will you dump me? Issues of trust will be issues for them forever. If one half of themselves cannot coexist with the other half of themselves how will they ever be whole?

The couples who are your friends and invite you over for dinner and picnics will grow fewer. When you are with other couples you will begin to feel 'less'.

You will spend more time with single mothers. Some will whine, some will support and soon many will be bitter, not better. Men think with one brain cell at a time. They are designed by God to pursue and have dominion over, to tend and keep and to bear fruit and multiply. If they cannot do that with the mother of their children they will move on. Many women believe their husbands abandoned them when in reality the husband had no choice in leaving.

The economy will not rally. In spite of the fact that he never gave you enough to feed the kids and buy diapers and spent too much in bars, you will have to leave your precious children with strangers more often than you want. You have no control over what they are exposed to when they are out of your sight. You will have to try to earn a meager living doing a job that is not your gift but you will be grateful for a job.

You will still wonder: when will he see the children, how will it go for them? When will he pay child support? What is causing the change in my child's (children's) behavior? Why are my child's ear's infected? Did she eat something she was allergic to? Where is he now?

Begin by using words in counsel with your husband and someone you trust perhaps your pastor or trusted friend.
